BACKGROUND

Background

All Local Authorities are required by the Department for Education (DfE) to publish an annual report to elected council members on how they are meeting their duty to secure sufficient childcare; and make this report publicly available and accessible to parents.

This report reflects the data that has been submitted to Essex County Council by childcare providers across Essex and relates to the available childcare places during the summer term 2024. An overall Essex position is presented, followed by summary information for each district area within Essex.

This report is part of a wider suite of intelligence used by the Early Years and Childcare Service to assess the sufficiency of childcare places in Essex, which includes information at a lower geographical level than is presented in this summary document.

Entitlement to Funded Childcare Places

Some children are entitled to childcare, funded by the government. These entitlements are for 38 weeks per year, or 570 hours stretched across 52 weeks.

- Children aged 2 whose families receive certain benefits (including low-income families in receipt of in-work benefits), or those who meet additional non-economic criteria, are entitled to up 15 hours per week. Nationally, about 40% of two-year-olds are entitled to this offer. In Essex, around 24% of two-year-olds are entitled to this offer.
- All children aged 3 & 4 are entitled to up to 15 hours per week until they start reception class in school
- Children aged 3 & 4 where both parents are working, or from lone parent families where that parent is working, are entitled to up to an additional 15 hours (30 hours) per week until they start reception class in school. This funding began in September 2017.
- Children aged over 9 months 3 years where both parents are working, or from lone parent families where that parent is working, are entitled to up to 15 hours per week. This funding began in phases from April 2024. It will be expanded further in September 2025.

Short Breaks Scheme

Short Breaks gives families the chance to take a break from their normal routines and enjoy activities together. Services include Clubs and Activities, such as after-school, holiday and weekend clubs, sports, arts and crafts, outdoor activities and drama and music clubs. TYPES OF CHILDCARE SETTINGS

Types of Childcare Settings

All Ofsted registered early years, and childcare settings have a duty under the Equality Act 2010 and the SEND Code of Practice 2015 to be inclusive and meet the needs of children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND).

Pre-schools and school run nurseries

These offer care, learning through play and early education for children up to 5 years old. This can be sessional or all day and is usually provided in term time for children aged between 2 and 5 years old. It is important to ask your provider about the days and hours their service operates to make sure it meets your requirements. They are registered and inspected by Ofsted to ensure that they follow the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) which sets the standards for the learning, development and care of children from birth to 5 years old.

Day Nurseries

These provide full or part-time care, learning through play and early education for children from babies up to 5 years old. Some may also provide care for older children before or after school, and during school holidays. They usually open from 7am to 6pm and operate all year round, including school holidays. They are registered and inspected by Ofsted to ensure that they follow the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) which sets the standards for the learning, development and care of children from birth to 5 years old.

Maintained nursery schools

These offer care, learning through play and early education for children up to 5 years old. This is sessional or all day and is provided in term time for children aged between 2 and 5 years old. They are registered and inspected by Ofsted to ensure that they follow the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) which sets the standards for the learning, development and care of children from birth to 5 years old. Maintained nursery schools have a headteacher and teachers who are responsible for no more than 13 children at any one time. There are 2 maintained nursery schools in Essex and they are both in Chelmsford.

Independent schools

These are usually run by private or voluntary organisations and are also known as private schools. Some independent schools have nursery classes (the same as a school nursery class). They are registered and inspected by Ofsted and the independent Schools Inspectorate (ISI) to ensure that they follow the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) which sets the standards for the learning, development and care of children from birth to 5 years old. Some will only offer places to children who are going to attend the school.

Childminders

They provide full or part-time care, learning through play and early education for children from babies up to 5 years old. Some may also provide care for older children before or after school, and during school holidays. Childminders work from their own homes and often offer flexible hours. Because they care for a smaller group of children, the learning may take place at home or out and about. They are registered and inspected by Ofsted to ensure that they follow the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) for childminders which sets the standards for the learning, development and care of children from birth to 5 years old in a childminder setting.

Childminder agencies

Some Childminders choose to be registered with a childminder agency (CMA) rather than directly with Ofsted. CMAs are licensed by Ofsted to register childminders on their behalf. CMAs are inspected by Ofsted annually. They give ongoing support and training to the childminders who are registered with them, and they ensure that they are following the Early years Foundation Stage (EYFS) for childminders.

Out-of-school care

These provide care and activities to fit around school hours for school-aged children. Out-of-school care includes breakfast clubs and after-school clubs (also known as wraparound care) and holiday childcare during school holidays. They are registered and inspected by Ofsted if they care for children under 8 years old.

Crèches

A crèche provides occasional care for limited periods of time. This could be if you are going shopping, attending a course or going to the gym. Crèches are not a long-term childcare option, and a parent or carer needs to remain close by. They are not always required to be registered with Ofsted.

Nannies

Nannies provide childcare in your own home and can look after children of any age. Nannies can choose to register with Ofsted and deliver the EYFS but this is not a requirement.

Babysitters

Babysitters provide childcare in your own home on an occasional basis. This is often outside of the usual hours of a registered childcare provider. Evenings and weekends are the most common times to use a babysitter. They are not registered with Ofsted. Our childcare provider finder does not include nannies and babysitters.

BACKGROUND

Essex County Council Districts


The county of Essex covers 14 districts, Essex County Council is made up of 12 of these districts as Southend and Thurrock are unitary authorities.

This report goes through demand and supply of childcare provision in each of the 12 districts.



Demand

In Essex the population is evenly distributed between age groups. The most prominent age group is 10-14 which constitutes 28.2% of the 0-19 population (98,513 children). The least populous age group is those aged 15-18 (21.5%).




Deprivation

A Lower Layer Super Output Area is a geographic area designed to improve the reporting of small area statistics in England and Wales. They normally comprise of between 400 and 1,200 households and have a usually resident population between 1,000 and 3,000 persons. This allows us to compare areas across the country as the populations are comparable.

The income deprivation affecting children index (IDACI) measures the proportion of all children aged 0 to 15 living in income deprived families in different local areas (called 'lower-layer super output areas', or LSOAs) across England. The lower the IDACI decile the more deprived the area is.

In Essex there are 872 LSOAs in total. Of these 5.4% are in the 10% most deprived LSOAs in the country. Essex has an average IDACI score of 0.144 which is ranked 101 out of 151 local authorities in England (where 1 is the most deprived). For context Tower Hamlets is the most deprived local authority and Isles of Scilly are the least.

BACKGROUND

Funded Early Education Entitlement (FEEE)


All children are entitled to 15 hours per week of Funded Entitlement starting the term following their third birthday. Parents can choose any nursery, preschool setting or childminder offering the funding. The offer can be taken for 15 hours per week over 38 weeks or stretched over 39-52 weeks depending on the business model. Since September 2017, working parents of three and four-year olds have been able to access 30 hours per week of Funded Entitlement if they meet the criteria. https://eycp.essex.gov.uk/funding/free-early-education-entitlement-for-three-to-four-year-olds/

Funded Early Education Entitlement for 2-Year-olds (FEEE2)

Two-year-old funded children can only be placed in settings (including with childminders) that have received an Ofsted grading of 'Good' or 'Outstanding' or newly registered settings that are awaiting their first registration. 2-year-old funding is provided for up to 15 hours per week for eligible 2-year-olds. Nationally, up to 40% of 2-year-olds can also claim 15 hours a week of funded childcare if they fulfil certain criteria. Unemployment (at end of August)

Between 2023 and 2024 the rate of unemployment in Essex has increased to 3.2%. For context this is 1.1% less than the overall rate in England.



Funded Early Education

Entitlement 3 & 4 year old (based on Summer Term)

Essex has an overall rate of 91.8% of families making use of FEEE 3 & 4-year-old entitlement. This represents an increase of 1.3% on the same period last year.

Funded Early Education Entitlement (based on Summer Term) 2-year-old

Essex has an overall rate of 86.8% of eligible parents accessing funding. This represents an increase of 4.8% on the same period last year.

BACKGROUND

Quality of Childcare Provision

All Early Years and Childcare providers must register with and be inspected by Ofsted, who give an overall grade for the quality of their provision. Childminders and private and voluntary childcare providers are on the Early Years Register, and schools and standalone maintained nursery schools are on the schools' register. The grades for both registers are equivalent. Schools with nurseries have an overall inspection grade, which is part of the early year's effectiveness grade within a whole school inspection.

Both schools and Early Years and Childcare providers have four possible Ofsted grades: Outstanding, Good, Requires Improvement, or Inadequate.

There are a total of 1223 inspected childcare providers in Essex. 98.1% of those funded by ECC, and that have been inspected, received a judgement of Good or Outstanding. This compares with 96.2% at the same period last year, an increase of 1.9%. Overall, 97.2% of providers achieve this standard.



WRAPAROUND CARE

Childcare Reforms and Wraparound provision

In Spring 2023 the government announced a National Wraparound Programme. The aim is to support all working families that need access to wraparound childcare provision in their local area.

Essex County Council are committed to work with providers to ensure there is sufficient provision for all parents that require it.

To help to meet these ambitious targets, the Department for Education announced £6.9 million of funding for Essex over the next 2 years to assist with the creation of new childcare places for primary school aged children from 8am until 6pm during term time.

We would expect to have further detail regarding the availability of wraparound provision in schools, as well as details of new or expanded provision that has been created to meet the increased demand, in our future Childcare Sufficiency Assessments.

Wraparound provision

Breakfast, Afterschool and Holiday club provision is delivered by Ofsted registered early years and childcare providers as well as schools and childminders.

Private, Voluntary and Independently (PVI) registered Wraparound

Across Essex, PVI providers deliver wraparound provision in all districts. These may differ, based on providers. Holiday clubs may not be available during all holidays.





IDACI Decile (where 1 is most deprived) by LSOA





There are a total of 169 inspected childcare providers in Basildon. 100.0% of those funded by ECC, and that have been inspected, receive a judgement of Good or Outstanding. This compares with 95.3% at the same period last year, an increase of 4.7%. Overall, 100% of providers achieve this standard.





IDACI Decile (where 1 is most deprived) by LSOA







IDACI Decile (where 1 is most deprived) by LSOA









Does your child attend more than 1 childcare provision?







From April 2024, eligible working parents of 2-year-olds can access 15 hours childcare support, this will be extended to children aged over 9 months from September 2024 (term after). By September 2025, most working families with children aged between 9 months and 5 years old will be entitled to 30 hours of childcare support.

Have you heard about this?





Do you think the increase in childcare funding for working families will encourage parents to return to work earlier after maternity leave, or increase their working hours?

56% (n=79) of families said yes, whereas 29% (n=41) said maybe and 15% (n=21) said no.

Tax-Free Childcare

Are you aware of 'Tax Free Childcare' which can help with the cost of childcare for working families?



36% (n=124) of respondent families answered yes I am aware, and use it to pay for my childcare costs whereas 22% (n=77) answered no, I am unaware of tax-free childcare.

Have you had any problems trying to pay through the Tax-Free Childcare Scheme?

Of the respondent families, 91% (n=119) reported no and 8% (n=10) reported yes; comments included below:

"I had lots of trouble registering my 2nd child took nearly 8 weeks, and still can't access childcare account"

"Sometimes money gets stuck there and I can't transfer to my childminder, meaning I'm paying late. I'm one of the lucky ones whose childminder doesn't then have to add late fees, she's very understanding. Friends have to pay late fees to nursery"


"Our setting needs to advertise this better"

Do you currently use Childcare for your school age children?



Why did you choose this option?


Of the respondent families, 81 based their choice on location and 50 based their choice on the hours of care offered.

Are you concerned that Covid has had a negative impact on your child's learning?







Of the respondent families, 77 answered pre-birth, and 68 searched for information when their youngest child was 0-6 months old.




If you wanted advice or guidance regarding caring for your child, where would you go to find this information?

The survey revealed that **50%** (**n=15**) of respondent families found the information provided **somewhat helpful** and **23%** (**n=7**) found it **very helpful**.


Are you aware of the Essex 'Talk Listen and Cuddle' campaign, and the range of free resources to help your child learn at home?


